President's Report

The Friends are proud to have celebrated our 50th anniversary year in 2016 as an active, strong organization powered by the energy of hundreds of volunteers. We continue much as our foundations were laid, but have added so much more. Many dedicated people put in many hours to keep all of our activities going.

Much of the Friends' time and energy are devoted to sorting and selling books and media donated by the public and discarded by the library all year round, led by Fred Eddy, Robin Eddy, Charlene Roman, and Bob Symons. Our sales of books serve 2 missions: one of course is to raise money, and the second is to get books into the hands of people at affordable prices. We are blessed by an amazingly literate and generous population, and the library provides space for our activities.

The Friends provided or funded programming for the public through the year: Monday noon programs (Books Sandwiched In and Table Talks), were coordinated by Gene Rowland. Special features included series on Revitalizing Schenectady and Introduction to Opera. Beat the Snow concerts on Sunday afternoons, coordinated by Janice Walz, offered a variety of music to appreciative audiences. We provided funds for children's and adult programs, such as vacation and summer reading programs, prizes, supplies etc. Our anniversary committee brought more special events to the community last year.

In 2016, we funded a major audio-visual upgrade for the McChesney meeting room, thanks to a bequest from Mary James, and provided funding towards the Phyllis Bornt Branch Library and Literacy Center.

We continue to fund the Museum pass program, staff development, equipment for the library, and library materials.



50th Anniversary Celebration

What a wonderful year it was – celebrating the achievements and ongoing efforts of the dedicated members of the Friends. The Mission of the Friends is to assist and support our library system in fulfilling its role as an essential institution dedicated to meeting the literacy, technology, and cultural needs of all members of our community. Book Sorting and Sales

During 2016 we held two large book sales, in the spring and fall, and one smaller midwinter sale in the McChesney Room. These book sale events, together with the Whitney Book Store, and our Online Sales are our three main sources of earned revenue.

Throughout the entire year, members of the Friends accept donated books from the community and discards from the library and work behind the scenes every week to sort and store them. Books first go through a primary sorting to dispose of low-quality books and separate good books into the primary categories of fiction, non-fiction, bookstore quality, children or young adults, and mass market paperbacks. The fiction team sorts their books by genre and author. Non-fiction books are scanned for possible sale on Amazon (see Online Sales) and then the non-fiction team sorts them into categories according to subject matter. Mass-market paperbacks are also sorted into genres by another team. Finally all of the boxes of sorted books are stored on shelves by the inventory team, or transported to the bookstore. Books that are of unsuitable quality are stored separately and sold to a recycling company.

We'd like to thank these volunteers, most of whom work every week for 2 to 3 hours and sometimes more, to sort, box and stack the donated books. The effort and time they put in each week make our three book sales a success.

Each book sale is organized and monitored by members of the Book Sale Committee with help from experienced volunteers. Before each book sale, Robin Eddy uses her database of volunteers to ask for help. Response from the community has been very positive, and we are able to fill more than 325 job-slots (setup, organizer, cashier and cleanup) for each of the major sales. Most of the volunteers are members of the Friends of SCPL, but we have also gotten volunteers from community-based groups such as Union College Students, local high schools, and supervised inmates from the county jail.

Finally, we want to thank the hundreds of unnamed people who volunteered during the book sales, as well as the community members who donate their used books generously and the customers who shop at our sales.

Newsletter/Publicity

The Friends newsletter saw two major changes in 2016: electronic distribution, via email, to all members requesting a digital copy and the color publication of print copies. Hard copies of the newsletter were made available at all Friends public events, the Whitney Book Corner and the library branches.

The 50th anniversary of the Friends saw a major increase in publicity, with our activities and organization being promoted on radio, in the newspapers and on a billboard overlooking Erie Boulevard in Schenectady.

Tracy Kidder's visit in November, 2016 was advertised extensively on social media, including the NYS Writers Institute and WAMC websites. As a result of reaching out to the Times Union, reporter Joe Stalvey conducted a phone interview with Kidder and his subsequent article helped to promote this event to areas outside of the immediate Schenectady area.

Publicity efforts are also ongoing for the Whitney Book Corner, with paid ads for the monthly sales appearing regularly in local media outlets. While websites for the Friends and the Whitney are continually updated, postings on Facebook are the main way the public is kept informed. The Friends Facebook page has 720 "likes", the Whitney 432. Whitney Book Corner

2016 was a very busy and productive year for the Whitney, increasing our sales 15% from 2015 and putting lots of great books back into the community and helped promote reading to children.

- We started the year with a two week clearance sale, which increased sales at what is usually a slow time of year.
- For Valentine's Day, the Whitney and Romance novels were a feature shown on Time-Warner Cable News.
- We participated in the Electric City Comic Con in July. The Whitney had two tables in vendor alley and we sold over \$800.00 worth of books and merchandise and increased our sales at the store to \$6000.00 for the month.
- The library's summer reading program awarded kids a free book coupon for reading a certain number of books over the summer. By October, we had already received over 150 coupons back.
- In order to participate in the Friends 50th anniversary, we featured each decade the Friends had been in existence. Starting in April with the 60's and ending in September there were books, trivia and memorabilia from each decade on display.
- Since the book store is right between the Greek fest and Italian fest, we put all Greek and Italian books on sale. The increased foot traffic always makes that weekend busy.
- The Harry Potter event was a great success with the classes at the library very well attended. It is going to become an annual event every October.
- In December, we teamed up with the library and had a Dr. Seuss movie, crafts and costumed characters.

Proposed Changes To The Bylaws Of The Friends

ARTICLE VI: BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1: General management of The Friends of the Schenectady County Public Library shall be vested in a Board of Directors of not more than 25 and normally not fewer than 17 members, excepting ex officio members. All members of the Board of Directors shall be members of The Friends.

ARTICLE VIII: COMMITTEES

Section 1: The standing committees shall include <u>Executive</u>, Membership, Program, Public Relations, Finance, Gifts and Endowment, Nominating, Bookstore, Newsletter, Online Sales, Book Sales, and Archives and other standing or ad hoc committees as deemed necessary from time to time by the Board of Directors. The duties of the committees are described in the committee guidelines.

<u>Section 6: The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers of the organization, Past President, and two other Directors elected annually by the Board of Directors.</u>
