BOOK SALE NEEDS BOOKS

The Friends third annual book sale will take place on SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 27 FROM 10 AM TO 2 PM IN THE COMMUNITY ROOM OF THE CENTRAL LIBRARY. Volunteers have been hard at work sorting books, magazines and records as they have come in. However, our collection seems smaller than last year. We can use hard covers and paperbacks for children, teens, and adults, records, and magazines of special interest such as Yankee, ones on decorating, antiques or science. They can be ropped off at the Central Library during the fours it is open.

If you are interested in aiding the sale itself, there is a need for strong backs to load and unload boxes of books on Thursday and Friday, September 25 and 26 (Know some willing teens?) and for workers for various shifts on Saturday, September 27. Even if you can spare only an hour or two, you can be very helpful.

Please make this sale even more successful than last year.

FROM THE PRESIDENT - Alice Niedrach

One of the important purposes of the Friends is to support the County Library System in all extensions of Library service and community programing for which staff and funds are not available from the County. The extent to which we can offer financial support for various activities such as: Doorstep, Young Adult Open House Sessions, Books for the Jail Library and Living Center, Ella Jenkin's program, family film series, and monies for Idio equipment in the Meeting Room is almost wholly dependent upon the income received from membership dues (individual \$2.00 thru patron \$100).

The extent to which we can organize and sponsor activities such as Books-Sandwiched-In, Lecture Series and the Book Sale is dependent upon the number of Friends who volunteer to give of their time. Responsibility for overall planning of yearly programs is assumed by the Board of Directors of the Friends totaling 22 plus 2 ex-officio Library representatives. Board Meetings are held 6 times a year. Selections of programs and activities and/or funds are discussed and decisions are made based upon requests from Staff, the membership and the public's response to programs. Because there is only one all membership-meeting, we on the Board hope that you, Friends, will communicate to us your ideas and suggestions throughout the year. Our next meeting is September 30 at 8 PM in the Board Room at the Central Library. Friends are welcome to join us.

We are not only grateful but dependent upon /our support (financial and time if possible). As Friends approach their 10th anniversary of founding we hope that this year will be as exciting and rewarding as the first nine.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

The two 1975 summer programs financed by the Friends provided entertainment and created interest in the library for a large number of children and teenagers. Reports by Miss Ruth L. Adams, Head of Work with Children and Mrs. Susanna C. Kimura, Young Adult Librarian, are given below:

DOORSTEP PROJECT 1975 - Ruth L. Adams

Children interested in stories, in the storytellers and in books to borrow highlighted the 1975 Doorstep Project. Rain, unusually hot weather, staff illness and a staff resignation offered problems to be overcome during the season. In spite of these difficulties, 1,227 stories were told to 6,359 children and 3,567 paperbacks were circulated. Lending books to children in the Van Vranken Avenue area was the only innovation this summer. This proved highly successful in its acceptance by the children and in the high degree of responsibility they took in returning the books. The idea of providing books for the adults on the routes came to the fore during the summer and offers a new idea for consideration for 1976. Children need the example of seeing parents with books in order to become more interested in books themselves and a project might be worked out with the adult department.

YOUNG ADULT OPEN HOUSE SESSIONS - ... S. C. Kimura

The summer series of nine Tuesday night open house sessions for young adults ended August 26th, a pleasant if fairly quiet success for the young people and staff involved. Word of mouth seemed to be our best publicity with little correlation between newspaper releases and attendance.

Films were, predictably, the highlight of many evenings. They were limited to short films that are frequently overlooked in adult programing and we had a good time rerunning the favorites several times. Before and after films most kids were involved in games and socializing. Card games and an ongoing jigsaw puzzle were very popular. Monopoly was also popular but the game was lost midway through the summer (this and the theft of the contribution can were our only losses, neither of which could be blamed on program participants.

The Casual format of this program worked out very well with this young teenage group. They like to be active, are very talkative and always are willing to set up, help with refreshments, or clean up. They pose a constant drain on energy simply because of the constant attention they demand, but they really are an enjoyable group!

The Library's Meeting Room provided a comfortable, informal atmosphere which we encouraged by using the table top screen for films. The only problem created by the setting was that outsiders frequently stopped in to use the rest rooms and sample our refreshments.



NEW PROGRAM OFFERED BY LIBRARY

Libraries throughout the country have become increasingly aware of the need for service to the adult independent learner - the person who wants to learn independently instead of by enrolling in a traditional school or college course. People seeking such help may want to work toward a degree by passing college proficiency or CLEP exams, may consider enrolling in non-traditional courses offered by Empire State College, or may want guidance in planning how they can study a subject or learn a skill on their own. The Schenectady ounty Public Library is now planning an individualized advisory service which will be available to anyone who wishes to investigate his options in learning.

In order to attract prospective learners and make them aware of the new service, special programs will be held in the Meeting Room at 7:30 PM on the first three Thursdays of Novem-

Although raised by the Friends, this money is turned over to us to supplement the Book Budget Fund. The Library buying power has declined due to these economic times. Thus we are so grateful there are additional monies for recordings, childrens' books and adult books.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK...E. Leonore White

Best wishes are extended to all the Friends for a happy, healtful 1976!!

The 1976 Library Budget, totaling \$1,464,454 has been adopted by the County Board of Representatives. As you may be aware, \$100,000 was cut from the manager's recommendation for the library's part-time salaries. In order to operate within budget allocations, many services which have been available will have to be reduced.

Mrs. Donovan F. Wade and Ronald C. Dixon have been reappointed by the County Board of Representatives to five-year terms on the Library Board of Trustees. Roger Yepsen has been appointed to replace Hugh M. Flynn for a term expiring in 1977.

FEDERAL GRANT SUPPORTS NEW LEARNER ADVISORY PROGRAM

The library has been engaged for the past year on a program financed through the Mohawk Valley Library Association by a special grant from the federal government under the Library Services and Construction Act. \$25,000 was granted for 1975, to be devoted to the development of services for the Adult Independent Learner within the Mohawk Valley Library system. SCPL, as the central library of the system, took over the responsibility for the acquisition of materials and equipment and the planning of programs to attract adult independent learners to the library. These could include adults working for degrees at such colleges as the Empire State and the New York State University Without Walls, adults working toward high school equivalency certificates, individuals interested in job improvement and advancement, and individuals interested in particular subjects or facets of learning. Three programs have been held in the Meeting Room, with an attendance of about 65 at each program. They included "Alternative Study," "How to Study" and "How to Use the Library." More programs are planned for the spring of 1976; and an additional grant has been awarded for 1976. A Job Information Center will be established in the library, to which people can come for information about job vacancies in the area. The information will be supplied on microfiche by the New York State Job Bank on a daily basis.

WHERE THE FRIENDS' \$ GOES

Funds received directly by the "Friends" from persons wishing to support the projects of the group are directed toward four categories - program, outreach, gifts of the library, and operating.

rogram consists of direct service to consumers within the premises of the library structure which are not part of the program supported by County funds. This year we will have supported two adult literature lecture series, Table Talks, Books-Sandwiched-In, a day for children with Ella Jenkins, and a summer teen program.

Our major outreach program is "Doorstep". It has been a story telling and paperback lending service in disadvantaged neighborhoods operating five days a week. Support is also given to purchasing paperbacks for the County Jail Library and the Living Center Library.

"Gifts to the Library" are generally for equipment items and special additions to the book collections. Some funds are also made available to library personnel to attend professional conferences. Fifteen titles have been added to the "Schenectady Collection" this year. Funds are given for special book purchases in recognition of retiring employees.

Major effort has gone into holding operating expenses of the Friends down. Your committee chairmen have done an excellent job this year. We hope that you are pleased with the present format of the Newsletter which represents a cost reduction.

This fiscal year was planned with expenditures exceeding antifipated income. Your Board was justified in planning this way because funds realized last year were not expended in that period. There is a reserve which has been accrued during the ten years of the "Friends" existence. The budgeted balance for the close of fiscal 75-76 is \$2,374.09. There is also a small restricted funds account.

A few figures are presented here. Detailed figures are always available from the Treasurer. our accounts are audited annually.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY; THE FIRST DECADE

The history of the Friends dates back to April 22, 1966, when the steering committee of the Committee for a New Central Library met to propose the organization of a Friends of the Library group. At that time a set of by-laws was adopted and a board of directors and slate of officers elected, with Mrs. T. A. Rich acting as first president. The expressed goal of the group was to "keep interest in libraries running high," and the members hoped that "the new Library would open in 1968."

The first Friends Board began to implement these goals by organizing a membership campaign and publishing a newsletter for the 163 members who responded in September 1966. Noon book review programs were begun, although these were held at the YMCA because facilities at the old library, located at Union Street and Seward Place, were poorly designed for such meetings. Individual Friends also urged County officials to make staff salaries competitive with those of other area libraries, and to consider construction of a more adequate library building.

Following this modest beginning the Friends' movement gained rapid momentum. Memberships increased as the public became more aware of the library and its needs. Groundbreaking ceremonies for a new central library took place in May 1967.

In the area of program, the Friends augmented their initial membership, newsletter, and book review activities with films prior to the noon YMCA "Table Talks on World Affairs," which were then under the sponsorship of a number of area organizations. The first annual dinner meeting of the Friends took place on April 22, 1968. Friends' funds were used for gifts to the library; staff members with long records of library service were honored, and the first volunteer of the year award was made.

On February 25, 1969, the Friends received their charter from the New York State Board of Regents, and the long-awaited move to the new central library was completed by the end of March 1969. The Friends were certified as a tax-exempt organization on September 8 of the same year. Memberships increased rapidly, and many gifts of equipment not provided for in the County budget were made possible through Friends' dues. To date these have included equipment for the Meeting Room kitchenette, a lighted podium and speaker system, improvements in lighting, a movie screen, a slide projector and table, an easel, a neck microphone, and extra speakers.

In other areas of the library, Friends' gifts are apparent, too. A portable display case and the lovely Beatrix Potter figurines in the Children's Room were among the first Friends' gifts intended for the central library. The staff lounge is equipped with cups and saucers and a painting provided by the Friends. A magazine bin and shelves at the front of the Reference Desk were Friends' gifts, in addition to a "Masterlens" which illumines and magnifies print for readers with limited vision.

The Friends have gradually become responsible for a growing number of activities in the Meeting Room. From mid-September through May, the book review programs known as "Books Sandwiched-In" alternate with series of Table Talks almost every Monday noon. A film series has been underwritten financially by the Friends about once a year, and many excellent courses in adult literature have been sponsored over the past several years.

A long series of special programs has been planned and executed by the Friends. Some have focused on the use of library materials; others have been exhibits featuring unusual book collections belonging to Schenectadians, or books popular in a certain period. An institute on story-telling for children conducted by Augusta Baker was sponsored by the Friends, and the nationally known folksinger, Ella Jenkins, has twice delighted Schenectadians with her musical rhythms. A poetry

reading by John Tagliabue was arranged by the Friends. Most recently they sponsored five evening Bicentennial lectures on little-known facts about Schenectady history,

No account of Friends' activities would be complete without some mention of their program of outreach. The Friends have sought to serve shut-ins, and have underwritten summer programs for the disadvantaged. Atrial film series in the Hamilton Hill area was followed by the Friends' peripatetic story-telling program for children known as the "Doorstep Project," which has been in operation since 1966, Friends also assisted staff in the establishment of a library for prisoners at the County Jail in 1970, and have been its chief source of funding since 1972. Several paper-back book outlets have existed, one of which still remains at the Hamilton Hill Drop-In Arts and Crafts Center. A small book collection purchased by the Friends is also on loan at the Living Center at Washington Irving School. Friends' funds were primarily responsible for the publication of the first Community Services Directory prepared by library staff in 1972. A listing of books suitable for interracial day-care centers was the joint effort of Friends and staff in 1973.

Because Friends believe strongly in continuing education for library staff, a small amount of funding has been provided since 1973 to help staff members attend professional conferences. But no degree of professionalism can compensate for lack of adequate library resources. The new library serves not only Schenectady County but the entire Mohawk Valley Library System. Friends have tried to augment county funds for the purchase of records and books during a period when printing, publishing, and postal costs have risen at an astronomical rate, Books have been donated to the library in honor of retiring staff and library board members. Funds have been provided for the purchase of books for the Schenectady Collection, of special interest in this Bicentennial year; and a microfilm copy of the Citizen, an early Schenectady newspaper, was presented to the library in 1974. In the past three years the annual fall book sale has been increasingly successful in providing funds for the purchase of new books.

The successful growth of the Friends' organization over ten years has certainly validated the vision and persistence of the group's charter members. It would be impossible to list all the individuals responsible, but much credit is due the past presidents, Mrs. T. A. Rich, Mrs. R. Hosmer Norris, Mrs. Charles Concordia, Mrs. John F. Brown Jr., Mrs. Lyman Johnson, Mrs. Peter Ipsen, and Mrs. Leonard Niedrach, as well as those named volunteer of the year, Mrs. E. MacDonald Stanton, Miss Louise Haughton, Mr. Fred McChesney, Mrs. R. Hosmer Norris, Mrs. Robert Burnett, Mrs. Harrison Beale, Mrs. Morrison Haviland, and Miss Lynn Cowden. It has been their privilege to assist a dedicated staff and an experienced and capable director, Miss Leonore White, in seeking to maintain the best in library service for Schenectady County and the Mohawk Valley Library System.

1976 Budget Cuts and Branch Friday Night Closing: \$100,000 was cut from the County Manager's request for part-time wages in the 1976 budget by the County Board of Representatives. The Library Board was given the opportunity to cut the \$100,000 from categories other than the part-time wage allocation; and it was clear that no supplementary funds would be available to the Library for 1976. A number of behindthe-scenes cuts have been made by eliminating purchase of equipment, branch repairs, and painting, and some book funds. But this is not enough. A further saving was effected by the elimination of branch library services on Friday nights from May 7 through the end of the year. This new schedule went into effect as planned and should result in a savings of at least \$5,000, in part-time wages and social security payments. It was difficult to decide to cut public services. Friday night is the least busy in the week for all library agencies and was selected for that reason.

The Central Library will continue to remain open on Friday evenings through the summer months in accordance with the State Commissioner of Education's regulations that a library serving 100,000 or more population must maintain a minimum standard of 60 hours per week.

FRIENDS \$ SUPPORT DOOR STEP AND FAMILY FILM SERIES

The Board of the Friends voted to give \$1,500 to the Door Step project. A librarian will visit the Hamilton Hill area to tell stories for five, 4 hour periods a week for 10 weeks.

\$300 has been ear marked to support the fall Family Film Series which will be held on alternate Friday evenings between September 24 and December 3. Volunteers are needed to help host. If you can assist please call our president.
