President's Report

I must repeat myself and say that working with the Friends has been one of the most gratifying experiences I can recall. Literally hundreds of volunteers work together to keep our library one of the best in the state. In my experience I have never had a request for help turned down.

2013 has been a very busy year. Former president Bill Leitch, after 4 years of successful leadership, turned over the reins to me. Like most of our leaders, his volunteering did not end with the end of his office. Bill serves on the building committee that is charged with planning the new Bornt Family Literacy Center on State Street. If you'll recall, the library is combining two city branches into one. A major chunk of the funding for the new building came from a bequest from longtime librarian and volunteer Phyllis Bornt. The center will open, hopefully, in early 2015.

One of the highlights of my year has been the volunteer and staff picnic in June. Even with a steady rain, almost 200 volunteers and staff enjoyed great food and socializing. Many thanks to our maintenance staff members, led by George Kirker, who set up everything and did the cooking.

The Friends board held its first volunteer expo in September. Details will be shown later in this report. Our noon programs have continued the excellent offerings of book reviews and speakers as have the music programs and poetry gala. Our directors, Karen Bradley, Serena Butch and MaryAnn Warner, have been very busy with new RFID technology as well as the many programs for adults and children. These also will be explained later in this report.

With the combined incomes from book sales, the Whitney Book Corner, online book sales and membership contributions, The Friends are able to provide just about every program offered at our libraries, along with books and media that are not provided for in the library's budget. Funds are also used for improving the furnishings and even some of the facilities.

2016 will mark the 50th anniversary of the Friends. Some of us are already looking ahead to planning a yearlong celebration highlighting the wonderful support given by the Friends to the library for five decades.

Music Committee

During the past year, the Music Committee was involved in organizing and presenting three different types of musical presentations. The major program was a twelve week "Beat the Snow" series of concerts every Sunday afternoon during the months of January through March. These were arranged by Chris Patrick, the widow of Ron Patrick who started and arranged the previous four series. This year, the total attendance was 852 for the series and the most popular concert was the Route Fifty 5, a brass ensemble which brought in an overflowing audience. Our new Blue Grass group this year, the Hilltown Ramblers Blue Grass Band, also drew a very large audience, as did performers from the Schenectady Light Opera Company. Our audiences for these series have been very faithful, with many patrons attending each and every concert! They voiced their delight with the varied nature of the concerts and many remarked that they looked forward to each concert. While the series continued in the beginning of 2014, the committee is faced with the challenge of continuing the series in the coming years as will be discussed later.

During April for the past seven years, the Music Committee has also sponsored a musical concert in cooperation with the Music Department of the Schenectady County Community College. A very enjoyable concert was presented by the students, coached by faculty members of the Department. The program included selections by the College choir, ensembles of different instruments and individual student presentations on the piano. These yearly concerts provide a wonderful opportunity for the general public to hear and appreciate the wonderful musical talents of our local youth.

Finally in June of 2013, the committee sponsored a musical presentation by Abby Dunn, soprano, accompanied by Michael Clement on the piano. Abby is a very talented musician, active in many musical groups while still in high school. The McChesney room is a fine setting in which talented young people in our community can hone their musical skills.

2014 marks 20 years since the acquisition and installation of the Steinway Grand Piano in the McChesney Room. Its purchase was possible through a public fundraising effort. The combination of the McChesney Room, the piano, and the many fine artists, particularly among the youth of our region, and an interested public together provide the ingredients for many musical concerts, if only an organizing group is on hand. The current Music Committee is very shorthanded and would welcome Friends who would join the committee and ensure these types of musical programs can continue as part of the Library's offerings.

Monday Noon Programs

The Friends are continuing to present interesting and informative programs on each Monday when the Library is open, from September of 2013 through May of 2014. These presentations are held in the McChesney Room of the Central Library, from 12:00 to 1:00 PM. The format varies through the program year, consisting of four different series: *Books Sandwiched In* book reviews (18 in all); *Special Features* (4); *Table Talks* (4) and *Science Lectures* (4). Special Features are coordinated by Gioia Ottaviano, Table Talks by John Karl, and the Science Series by Walter Grattidge. The Books Sandwiched In reviews are coordinated by three teams consisting of Jo Ann Adams and Richard Holt (Fall 2013); Patricia Rush and John Karl (Winter 2013-14); Susie Leon and George Wise (Spring 2014). Overall coordination of the Monday Noon Series is the responsibility of Gene Rowland, who wishes to say a large "Thank You" to all of the volunteers who make this series possible, including the many speakers who give graciously of their time to present the programs.

The public image of the Friends of the Library received a huge boost in 2013 with the design of a colorful, dynamic new logo. The logo, equally attractive in black and white, adorns all of our publications, including a wonderful banner hanging in the McChesney Room.

We have introduced a new feature in our newsletter and on the website called "Tell Us Your Story". Through videos and

written stories, we have collected the recollections of SCPL patrons as they relate the importance of libraries in their lives. Our Facebook pages for both the Friends of SCPL and the Whitney Book Corner continue to garner new "likes" every day. We utilize the free advertising provided by the Downtown Schenectady Improvement Corporation weekly email to announce Whitney Book Corner sales as well as important library events. Our paid advertising includes the Daily Gazette, Metroland, Downtown Schenectady Magazine, Schenectady Symphony Orchestra playbill and the Capital District Guides. In the fall and spring, the yellow yard sales signs advertising the book sales pop up all over the community.

The Friends newsletter received a major facelift in 2013. The new format, which provides a substantial increase in space, enables us to utilize photos to showcase our volunteers and activities, include a feature recognizing member contributions, provide regular columns from the president and library director, and present a more professional, attractive publication.

Book Sales

During 2013, the large spring and fall used book sales and two smaller mid-winter book sales continued to provide nearly half of the annual revenue of the Friends of SCPL. This is possible only with a lot of effort by volunteers who work at the sales themselves and also by those who work throughout the year, getting ready for the sales.

Each book sale is organized and monitored by members of the new Book Sale Committee with help from experienced members. Before each book sale, Robin Eddy uses her database of previous and new volunteers to ask for help in the new sale. Response from the community has been

very positive, and we are able to fill 360 positions with volunteers for each of the major sales. Many of the volunteers are members of the Friends of SCPL, but we have also gotten volunteers from community-based groups such as Union College Student Activities, local high schools, The Center for Community Justice, and a large group from GE Energy Learning Center in Niskayuna.

Long before each book sale, members of the Friends work behind the scenes every week to organize the used books donated by the community. Bob Symons does the primary sorting of each donated book. Joan Malloy, Leah Leonard and Pat Stearns sort the fiction books by author with the help of Joanne Griffin and Bev Glover.

The non-fiction books are sorted into categories by Sally and Simon Weinstein, Susie Leon, Robin Eddy, Donna Hennel and some students on vacation (Anna, Catherine and Seth). Sylvia Curley deals with the children's books with the help of Dottie Potochnik and Donna Fairlee while Fred Marx and Judy Dillenbeck sort all the paperbacks. Ellie Rowland sorts Christmas books and provides experienced help where needed. Bern Allenson handles music and Nancy Virkler organizes movies and is the treasurer/coordinator for our sales. Rich Leon finds storage space for our huge inventory of books with help from Ken Nyeu and Fred Eddy, while Keith Rolfe delivers selected books to the Whitney Book Corner.

As a result of this huge cooperative effort we have brought in total 2013 revenue of \$42,804, with sale-related expenses of \$2,407, for a net income of \$40,397

We look forward to 2014 Book Sales with new ideas. For example, we have decided to combine the winter fiction and non-fiction sales into a much larger sale which will use the McChesney Room. We will continue to try to improve our book sales, while making them more convenient to our volunteers and our customers. Many thanks to all who have helped or have shopped at our used book sales!

Books-on-Line

The sale of books via the web was initiated to realize the full value of some of the books that are offered for sale. Watching the "dealers" comb our inventory for their own profit provided a stimulus and our on-line operation was started in 2007. During the year 03/01/2013 to 03/01/2014, we sold 650 units (a unit is almost always one book, occasionally a set). The gross for this period was \$17,413.29 and \$11,917.68 was deposited in the Friends account.

The operation was staffed with very able volunteers: Rickie Gageway, Mary Trivilino, Charlie Hatch, Julie Shepelavy, Janie Hayner, Shawn Schultz and me. Recently Shawn has taken over the administration of the operation and Miranda Rand has joined the group.

As always space limitations have limited the number of books we can maintain as inventory, but recent "concessions" by the Library have allowed for some expansion and therefore more books and sets posted on line.

WHITNEY BOOK CORNER

The annual income from our special monthly sales has increased by \$3600 since 2012. The most popular sales topics were mysteries, travel, records, and craft/hobbies. In 2013, 13,570 customers visited our store. Advertising has played a big part in our success. We



advertise on the Friends website, DSIC [Downtown Schenectady Improvement Corporation], Gazette, and posters/flyers. Let's not forget the clerks, sorters, shelvers, book transporters, and publicity volunteers, who work so hard to provide funds and programs for the Library.

We have updated the cooling system. A new air conditioner was installed above the main door entrance, and the air conditioner in the rear was refurbished.

The WBC continues to give free book coupons to various groups: The Summer Reading Program at the Library & Branches; volunteers that helped with the Friends Spring/Fall Book Sales. We continue to participate in the "Return the Favor" program, giving 50% discounts to all military veterans.

We had special coupon sales and book sales to go along with community events such as the September Downtown Schenectady Stockade Art Show, The Little Italy Festival and the Greek Festival. In November, we joined with other merchants in the historic lower Union St. area for a "Holiday Open House". Seasonal decorations with luminaries lining the sidewalk gave a festive feel.

Literary Trips

Responses to the bus trips sponsored by the Friends of SCPL in 2013 were overwhelming. On June 8, fifty members traveled to Quincy, Ma. to visit the Adams National Historical Park, run by the National Parks Service. The trip included tours of three homes: the birthplace of John Adams, second President of the United States, the first home of Abigail and John Adams, birthplace of John Quincy, and the "Old House" where John and Abigail moved when they returned from the White House. It was also the



retirement home of John Quincy Adams, who stipulated in his will that a stone structure be built on the property to house his personal library, also part of the tour.

In conjunction with this trip, the Friends held a program on John Adams and his wife Abigail at the Schenectady Public Library on May 13. The speaker for this program was Jim Sefcik, retired Director of the Louisiana State Museum and early American History expert.

The second trip was on September 4 to Hyde Park, New York to visit the Vanderbilt Museum, the FDR Museum and library and tour the FDR home. Lunch was at the Culinary Institute of America, the nation's premier school for preparing our top chefs. Fifty members were on this trip, which had a waiting list of twenty-five people, one of the Friends most popular trips in terms of response. All of our trips usually fill up quickly. Twelve people signed up as new members of the Friends for these trips.

Many thanks go to Val Catlin who takes care of registrations, Chris Witkowski who handles publicity for the Friends and Nancy Virkler, Friends Treasurer, who makes sure the bills are paid.
