TELL US YOUR STORY

It wasn't until I entered grade school that I had ever been in a library. My folks had plenty of reading material at home and I had become a proficient reader before entering kindergarten. It was my 2nd grade teacher, Miss Ford, who spotted a need in me to escape from the boring reading lessons typical of 2nd grade. She called on her principal, Wendell Andrews, for a solution for my ennui. Mr. Andrews knew what to do. He came to my class, took me by the hand and led me to the library, where he instructed the librarian to put me to work. That's how I spent my "reading time", organizing and shelving books.

My love of reading increased and, with my own library card, on the first day of summer vacation from junior high, I would ride my bike to the Schenectady library on Seward and Union Streets, and fill up the bike's saddle bag with interesting titles for my summer reading. Later, as a history teacher, I would always assign a reading/research project for each of my classes every year. No one on the faculty utilized the library more than I did.

After retiring, I became involved with several nonprofits as a volunteer and eventually wound up with my first love, joining the Friends in 2002. I have helped set up the Whitney Book Corner and assisted my wife, Gail, as she managed the store for several years.

Now that I am well into senior citizenship, I still have a need to read, but unfortunately my failing eyesight

does not allow me to read normal print material. Once again, the library solved my problem. With my iPad and library privileges in four libraries, Howard County, Maryland, Hillsborough County, Florida, the New York Public Library and, of course, the capital region libraries, I can borrow ebooks online and continue to read. There are some drawbacks. Library online services cannot provide an abundance of materials, especially new releases, so it is often a long wait before I get to be first in line for a title. That being the case, I find myself signing out books that I might never look at except that they are available.



BOOKS SANDWICHED IN

Sept. 11: Bellevue: Three Centuries of Medicine and Mayhem at America's Most Storied Hospital by David Oshinsky. Reviewed by Rob Dickson, one of our most popular reviewers for the Friends, the book is a chronicle of the history and evolution of a hospital, its staff, the city of New York and American medicine. This dramatic story of human suffering, social calamity, and scientific ingenuity is full of fascinating, and sometimes horrifying, "firsts".

Sept. 18: Arthur and Sherlock: Conan Doyle and the Creation of Holmes, by Michael Sims. Reviewed by Courtney Powers, founder of The Avenging Winters of Albany, a Sherlock Holmes society. Mystery lovers will delight in this story of how Doyle, a medical doctor, modeled the brilliant iconic detective largely on Dr. Joseph Bell, his medical school professor. Not a biography, this work examines the influence of Doyle's experiences as well as the role of earlier detective fiction in creating the inimitable sleuth.


Sept. 25: **Born a Crime: Stories from a South African Childhood** by Trevor Noah. Reviewed by Jack Rightmyer, English teacher and book reviewer for the Albany Times Union. Noah, a comic and host of The Daily Show, recounts, in a series of touching stories, his early years as the mixed-race child of a Swiss-German father and Xhosa mother as South Africa transitioned from apartheid to majority rule. The book is also a tribute to the influence of his extraordinary mother.

Oct. 2: Dr. Larry Lewis, retired GE chemist, is author and reviewer of **Sadie's Boys**, a hot-off-the-press memoir of his father and uncle's experiences in the second World War, and their mother's fight to get them back.

Oct. 16: **The Quartet: Orchestrating the Second American Revolution, 1783-1789**, by Pulitzer
Prize winning historian Joseph J. Ellis. Reviewed by retired physicist and veteran Books Sandwiched In presenter Donald Gavin. The author assesses the importance of Washington, Hamilton, Madison, and John Jay, in reshaping the loose confederation of states after the Revolution into the centralized nation it became under the U.S. Constitution. A treat for Hamilton fans, as well as students of American history.

Oct. 23 **The Enigma of the Owl: An Illustrated Natural History**, by Mike Unwin and David Tipling.
Reviewed by independent Environmental/Outdoor
Education Specialist George Steele, of Seek No
Further Farm.

NOON PROGRAMS

History and Opera



October/November

November is New York History Month and the anniversary of some major events in New York-votes for women, the beginning of the Erie Canal, entrance into World War I, and the anti-women's suffrage movement. To acknowledge the important events that took place in our state, the Friends of the Library have organized a series of presentations on them. A special thank you to Patricia Rush for coordinating the series.

October 30: "Spotlight: Albany and Anti-Suffrage" A new exhibit at the Albany Institute of History and Art, will be presented by Patrick Stenshorn, the Interpretive Program Manager at the Institute. He will discuss the founding of the anti-women's suffrage organization in New York in 1894. Women were granted the right to vote in New York in 1917; three years later the federal government granted women the right to vote.

November 6: **Erie Canal** Brad L. Utter, Senior Historian and Curator of Science and Technology at the New York State Museum, will speak about the exhibit he has curated, *Enterprising Waters: New York's Erie Canal*. Phase One of the exhibit, on display now, focuses on the beginnings of the canal 200 years ago, and chronicles the canal's construction and its impact along the route.

November 13: **World War I** Aaron Noble, Senior Historian and Curator of Political and Military History at the New York State Museum, will speak about the pivotal role New Yorkers played in all facets of World War I. The exhibit he has curated, *A Spirit of Sacrifice: New York State in the First World War*, commemorates the centennial of New York's entrance into the conflict.

November 20: The Electric Mule on the Erie Canal Most accounts of the Erie canal focus on its creation and its significance in early 19th century American history. Few, however, dwell on its last days. In this talk, Professor Andrew Morris of the Department of History at Union College, looks at the last ditch effort by canal supporters to revive it through the use of electricity, culminating in the high-profile test of a G.E. "electric mule" on a stretch of the canal in Schenectady.

November 27: **Women's Suffrage** Jennifer Lemak, Chief Curator of History at the New York State Museum, will speak on the exhibit: *Votes for Women: Celebrating New York's Suffrage Centennial*. She will be joined by Ashley Hopkins-Benton, Senior Historian and Curator of Social History at the New York State Museum.

December 4: Dr. Frank Strauss will entertain us with a program entitled **Beautiful Music**. We will listen to, view, and talk about an aria, "O mio babbino caro", from Puccini's opera **Gianni Schicchi**. There is more to this piece than just breathtakingly beautiful music. As is so often the case with wonderful music, many people perform it, and the personalities and circumstances of some of the performers may be as interesting as the music. "O mio babbino caro" has been sung by many soprano singers, with perhaps the most memorable being Maria Callas. We will view a short video biography of La Divina, and then watch, thanks to our friends at YouTube, some videos of Callas singing.

December 11: Professor Josef Schmee returns to SCPL to present two opera programs. The first program will be **The Marriage of Figaro** by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. This is a comic opera in four acts, composed in 1786. It is one of the ten most popular operas. The story deals with two servants, Figaro and Susanna, who succeed in getting married, thus foiling their philandering employer Count Almaviva, who attempts to seduce Susanna, and teaching him a lesson in fidelity.

December 18: Professor Schmee presents another very popular opera, **Rigoletto**, by Giuseppe Verdi. This opera is in three acts, and is considered to be one of Verdi's masterpieces. The story revolves around the licentious Duke of Mantua, his hunch-backed court jester Rigoletto and Rigoletto's beautiful daughter Gilda. Dr. Schmee will pay tribute to the famous Italian tenor Luciano Pavarotti, who was great in the role of the Duke of Mantua in this opera.

The Fall Book Sale on September 23-24 was a great success! The weather was sunny and warm on both days, and a large turnout of book lovers gathered to browse and buy throughout the weekend. With over 60,000 books for sale, they found plenty worth buying. Many people walked away with armloads of books and smiles on their faces.

Volunteers from the community signed up to fill most of our needed 300 job slots from Friday setup to Sunday cleanup. Our team of book sale volunteers made sure the books were organized by category or author's name, helped buyers to find what they wanted and cashed out the sales. In addition, we had four inmates from the Schenectady Jail who helped with the Friday setup.

A number of students from Schenectady High School and Union College pitched in to add their energy during setup, cleanup and during the sale. An extra special thanks goes to Chief Thompson, who recruited 16 Jr. ROTC students from the high school to help us the entire weekend. Without them the book sale would have been quite overwhelming and demanding for our core group of volunteers.

We measure our success in two ways. At this sale we made \$15,775.58, which is about \$750 less than we made last fall. But more important is the fact that we sold tens of thousands of books to people at very low prices!

Unfortunately, we receive so many donated books that cannot be sold.

Sorting out these books takes time and much lifting. We have to sell them for a nominal price to a wholesale book company. We fill a large commercial truck about every 6-8 weeks with the books we cannot sell! We wish we didn't have to waste our time on these books, so PLEASE donate only books we can sell.

The Fall Book Sale is always a wonderful community event! We want to thank everyone who volunteered at the sale, and especially the team of Friends who work every Wednesday throughout the year to prepare books for the sale.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Happy New Year to all!

Come and enjoy a highlight of the winter season,

the Beat the Snow music series on Sunday afternoons January-March, (except book sale day 2/4) in the McChesney Room. Janice Walz has arranged programs featuring a variety of local performers and musical genres, with something for everybody.

Why does the Friends of SCPL matter?

• Because we partner with library staff and the library board to offer more and better services and materials to the public. Karen Bradley and the library staff, and Carmel Patrick and the library board, have worked hard to improve the library's facilities and services. The County provides basic support, which is their job, and the Friends enhance the library's programs, services, and collections.

- Because our volunteers process and get value from vast amounts of book donations and library discards. This is an enormous task, carried on by dozens of hard-working volunteers all year-round.
- Because we fund purchases for the library that they cannot afford otherwise. SCPL is funded at a lower level than other larger libraries in the region and the tax cap has kept funding limited. SCPL's revenue in 2015 (last available statistics) was \$35 per capita, and that supported 8 branches. Clifton Park-Halfmoon library's funding per capita was \$74; Albany's (with 6 branches) was \$92, more than two and a half times SCPL's; and Saratoga's \$110.

Volunteerism and generosity are a strong tradition in our community; your contributions make a difference, to an institution that makes a difference. Thank you.




