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Friends of SCPL pivots programming during the pandemic

The COVID-19 pandemic has forced the Friends to quickly reassess our programming and figure out how we can to continue to serve the community and the library in a safe manner.

Friends of SCPL hosted socially distanced sidewalk book sales at the Karen B. Johnson Library on July 12 (biographies and adult fiction titles) and August 9 (children's books).

Christy Multer was one of the many participants at the July Sidewalk Sale. She said, "It was a great sale! Thank you to all the volunteers who had clearly spent a LOT of time organizing every detail -- even making sure the book titles were all in the same direction in each box for easier reading. My husband and I got

34 books for only \$19, including one of the bags of 20 mystery paperbacks for only \$5. And thank you to the person who selected such a nice variety of mysteries in that bag -- including several authors we've never read before, which will be fun to explore."

In addition to these sidewalk sales, our online bookstores are running again, and our physical bookstores are open with new social distancing policies in place.

BOOKS SANDWICHED IN

September 14: Sapiens

From a renowned historian comes a groundbreaking narrative of humanity's creation and evolution - a number one international best seller - that explores the ways in which biology and history have defined us and enhanced our understanding of what it means to be "human".

September 21: The Hudson Valley: The First 250 Million Years: A Mostly Chronological and Occasionally Personal History

The mighty Hudson River is the centerpiece of this fascinating collection of essays, ranging from prehistoric times to current life. It touches on a wide variety of topics, including the author's own personal stories of the region. Penned in an enjoyable and sometimes humorous style, Levine offers up an introduction to the fascinating people, places, and events that have helped define this wonderful Hudson Valley that some of us call home.

October 5: Haven: The Dramatic Story of 1000 World War II Refugees and How They Came to America

In 1943, FDR decided to admit 1000 war refugees to the U.S. Gruber volunteered to accompany the group from Europe on their dangerous and secret route across the Atlantic. A poignant and engrossing true story.

October 19: A Woman Condemned: The Tragic Case of Anna Antonio

A sensational murder, trial, and a young woman's execution in Depression-era New York draws upon newly discovered NY State Police records. In Greiner's description of the trial, he seeks to show how flaws in the judicial system, poverty, and prejudice around the Italian American community in Albany at the time, all played a part in Anna's conviction and death sentence.

October 26: Giants of the Monsoon Forest

For more than a thousand years, the people and elephants of Burma/Myanmar and India have worked with elephants to log otherwise impassable forests and to move people and goods (sometimes illicitly) under cover of the forest canopy. The relationship between elephant and rider is an intimate one that lasts for many decades. Though not bred to work with humans, these elephants can lift and carry logs, save people from mudslides, break logjams in raging rivers and navigate mountain forests with passengers.

FRIENDS TRIPS



In Memory of John Goldsmith

When the late Lisa Holt, coordinator of the Friends literary day trips, dreamed about expanding the travels to England, she knew just the person to call. Her good friend and fellow librarian, Diane Goldsmith, was married to a man who had conducted tours of his native England. She posed this question to Diane, "would John be interested in designing a custom tour for the Friends?"

The answer was a resounding yes, and John Goldsmith, who died on June 16 at the age of 81, got to work planning a two week excursion to England, with a focus on literary and historical sites. In meticulous detail John created an itinerary that not only included visits to museums, but also to first rate hotels and restaurants. Every single meal was scheduled, every hotel chosen with high standards in mind.

Thus, in May of 2011, two dozen members of the Friends embarked on a multi-day tour that included, among others, stops in Jane Austen's and the Bronte family's birth places, Stratford-upon-Avon, Winston Churchill's home, and the Lake District, the beautiful area of England that inspired the writing of Beatrice Potter and William Wordsworth.

To say the trip far exceeded the Friends expectations would be an understatement. And John didn't stop there. He planned another trip to England as well as trips to France and Ireland. Throughout the tours Diane was always at John's side, ensuring that everything transpire flawlessly. The two were a magnificent pair, exuding confidence, calm and humor.

In a recent discussion with Diane she said, "I don't have the words to describe how much he loved

doing those tours. It was an opportunity to not only show his beloved homeland but he so enjoyed meeting and talking to everyone he met."

The Friends of the Library are eternally grateful to John and Diane for the efforts they undertook to give our members the wonderful gift of travel. To Diane we extend our deepest sympathies and a heartfelt "thank you, thank you,"

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Friends of SCPL Advocates for Branches to Open

When it became apparent in late August that many libraries in the surrounding communities were reopening with proper COVID-19 protocols in place, some members of the Friends of the Library began to question why the SCPL system was still closed, except for curbside services. The subject was discussed at the August Board meeting and it was decided it was time for our organization to begin a movement to urge the County to move forward with reopening.

A committee of several Board directors was formed and they quickly developed a multifaceted advocacy campaign. An email blast was sent to the entire Friends membership, listing the many ways the public could make their voices heard,

including signing a petition, contacting their local legislators and submitting a comment for Privilege of the Floor at a County Legislature meeting. A link to view the September livestreamed Legislature meeting was posted on our website and Facebook page.

The response to our campaign was immediate and positive, with dozens of people signing the petitions and several submitting comments to the Legislature. The Daily Gazette printed the Board's letter urging the reopening; many people posted messages of support on our Facebook page.

LIBRARY OPENING ADVOCACY (CONTINUED)

At the September 8 County Legislature meeting, six Privilege of the Floor submissions addressing the issue were read aloud. That portion of the meeting was concluded with a recommendation from Anthony



Jasenski, Sr., Chairman of the Legislature, that the County move forward with a plan to reopen the libraries by October 1.

As of this newsletter's deadline, five of the branch libraries were slated to reopen on a limited basis on October 5. Surprisingly, the Karen B. Johnson Library is not one of them; no reopening date has been set at this time. The continued closure of SCPL's largest, most centrally located library, makes no sense. It impacts not only city residents without transportation, but also drastically impedes the Friends ability to resume their fundraising efforts.

The push to get Central reopened soon will be the focus of a continuing advocacy campaign. Updates will be posted on our <u>Facebook page</u>, website, and in email blasts.

January 4 - Financial Exclusion: How Competition Can Fix a Broken System

Wright's synopsis on p. 1 reveals his well-supported but unorthodox view: "This book is about financial exclusion, discrimination, and predation . . . Its main goal is to persuade readers, via an historical narrative informed by economic theory, that the best way to combat financial discrimination is through the encouragement of new entrants, not top-down regulation." After describing the evolution of the complex U.S. financial system, he focuses on four groups discriminated against: African-Americans, our "First Peoples," "White Trash," and women.

Book by Robert E. Wright, Presented by Brad Lewis

January 11 - Piglet's Process: Process Theology for All God's Children

This critique will look at the content of this charming short book and the problems of the use of myth to explain things. This will be a good review for folks unfamiliar with Process Theology and a cautionary tale about the interplay of mythos and logos.

Book by Bruce G. Epperly, Presented by Dr. Bill Levering

January 25 - Colors of the Mountain

In writing this memoir, Mr. Chen shares the intimate details of his struggles to succeed while growing up in China during Mao's Cultural Revolution. His words have inspired readers to continue on their own journeys, no matter how difficult the road might be. The review will be presented as a tribute to this beloved Chinese American author.

February 1 - The Deficit Myth

The Deficit Myth is a non-technical presentation of a version of economics called Modern Monetary Theory. That theory makes some very unconventional assertions: for example that "in almost all instances deficits are good for the economy," that "the idea that taxes pay for what the government spends is pure fantasy," and that, counter to what you may have heard, deficits do not crowd out private investment, do not put the U.S. at the mercy of China, and do not endanger the future of Social Security. The author, Stephanie Kelton, is one of the creators of Modern Monetary Theory, a Professor of Economics at SUNY-Stony Brook, and an economic advisor to the Biden campaign team.

February 8 -

The Reconstruction Presidents

In this work, author Brooks Simpson, a very well published author on the subject, looks at Reconstruction from the perspectives of Presidents Lincoln, Johnson, Grant, and Hayes. It deals with the nearly intractable, hopelessly thorny national problem of just how should America become one country again after a terrible Civil War without carrying the scars forever. Simpson looks closely into the manner in which these four presidents handled the re-knitting of the political and social national fabric and finds that their own personal styles had a great deal to do with their successes and failures. Simpson shines light on a poorly understood, but critical era of American history whose echoes can be heard today.

February 22 - The Searcher



IN MEMORY OF SAM WAIT


The Friends of SCPL first learned of Sam Wait's love of the library several years ago when he answered our call for personal stories of library memories (Tell Us Your Story, Nov./Dec. 2013 Newsletter). But it was when Friends president Charlene Roman received a call from a financial advisor telling her of Mr. Wait's death on January 23, and his wish to remember the Friends with a bequest, that we suspected his appreciation for our library might be expressed a little more than through fond memories.

Mr. Wait was an Associate Dean of Science at RPI and served as Acting Dean of Science on three separate occasions. He received numerous honors from the college, including the Outstanding Faculty Award in 1988. His wife, Carol, shared his love for libraries; having earned a master's degree in library science, she became the Serials Librarian at the Capital District Library Council. The two were long time members of the Friends, joining as benefactors in 1971.

Sam's library story, reprinted below, will now be expanded to include a whole new chapter for the Friends. His very generous donation will firmly memorialize his devotion and appreciation for the library he loved so much.

Sam's Library Story

"My first job was as Page Boy Third Class at the Brandywine Branch of the Library. Theoretically, all I could do was shelve books that had been returned by borrowers. The librarian in charge at that time was Miss Adele Brown (Hopefully I have her name correct.) However, she went home for dinner leaving me alone in the Library for a while. During that time I checked out books and even tried to answer some reference questions. One I remember well was from a boy who wanted to know about 'boondoggle', a material for making a lanyard out of thin plastic fibers. I was able to point him to the Boy Scout handbook which had the answer. If I remember correctly I was paid \$0.35 per hour for this part time job in 1948 or 1949."







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
